- Continued deterioration of properties on the East side 3rd, 4th, and 5th Streets specifically
- How we address low-income housing dispersed across community or centralizes in one area

- Trash/leaf/bulky item pickup
 - Maybe offer bulky item pickup more than once a year to stop people from leaving items on curb throughout the year or illegal dumping of items

 - When coming off US 52 at Martin Luther King Blvd, all directional signage points to the west for Downtown. No signage points to the east.
